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How Time Flies

150 years ago – 1873

President Edwards reported the previous academic year's enrollment numbers to the Board. The Normal Department had 442 students, the High School had 77 students, the Grammar School had 150 students, and the Primary School had 59 students. The total number of students at ISNU for the 1872-73 academic year was 728. Edwards noted that enrollment was down "somewhat less than usual," presumably because of the cholera pandemic of 1873. However, the second half of the year saw a slight increase from the front half and "has also been notable for its preponderance of young men."

100 years ago – April/May/June 1923

- Illinois State Normal University emerged victorious on the 20th anniversary of the first literary contest between two normal schools. Competing against Western Illinois State Teachers College, Normal took "reading and extempore speaking" while Western won oration. Normal students Ross Holt and O.C. Echols would represent ISNU at the May inter-state tournament in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. *The Vidette*, April 4, 1923 (Vol. 35, No. 27, pg. 1).
- William Bishop Owen, President of the National Education Association and professor at Chicago Normal College was chosen to be the speaker at ISNU's 64th annual commencement. According to *The Vidette*, Owen "will be one of the most prominent educators who ever lectured before a Normal graduating class." *The Vidette*, May 2, 1923 (Vol. 35, Nos. 31, pg. 1).
- President Felmley dispenses advice to summer school students, including the kinds of courses to take, not to overload on summer courses, and living in rented homes of Normal residents. Felmley stresses that while the residents of Normal and Bloomington are excited about their stay, "Many citizens open their homes at considerable personal inconvenience." Thus, a contract was devised for renters and tenants to make the arrangement more comfortable. *The Vidette*, June 11, 1923 (Vol. 35, No. 36, pg. 1).

75 years ago – April/May/July 1948

- After fully revising the Student Council rules, two students ran for Student Council president. Joe French and Sally Surratt. Senior, junior, and sophomore classes were urged to vote the next day in Old Main as "The race for Student Council head is one of the most important in years, since the winner will preside over a freshly revised and more representative body." *The Vidette*, April 28, 1948 (Vol. 60, No. 26, pg. 1).
- Dr. Percy I. Julian was announced as the speaker for the Honors Day convocation slated for May 12. Dr. Julian, the director of research at Glidden Company, Soya Products division, was noted as one of America's foremost chemists. The

convocation plans included awarding honors to "three percent of the undergraduate body having the highest point average." *The Vidette*, May 5, 1948 (Vol. 60, No. 27, pg. 1).

- *The Vidette* staff announced a major change in the format and printing of the paper. Once printed at the local paper *The Normalite*, *The Vidette* moved to Bloomington printer Bernie Gummerman of 217 E. Front St. The move meant that the paper could accommodate up to eight pages of news—though they couldn't afford to print eight pages until the fall term. *The Vidette* thanked the "hard-working" printers at *The Normalite* for "a lot of painstaking effort and silent suffering at the expense of a green *Vidette* crew last semester, and, no doubt, many other semesters." *The Vidette*, July 8, 1948 (Vol. 61, No. 1, pg. 1).

50 years ago – April/May/July 1973

- Henry J. Hermanowic, professor of Education, was elected as president of the Illinois Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. Affiliated with the national organization, American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education, the major purpose of the state organization "is to represent, promote, and improve the education of professional school personnel by working with all segments of higher education, public education, and the public, including legislative bodies." *The Vidette*, April 4, 1973 (Vol. 85, No. 4, pg. 1).
- Betty Friedan and Phyllis Schlafly were scheduled to "share platform as spokeswomen" in Capen Auditorium on May 1. Friedan, the founder of the National Organization for Women and the National Women's Political Caucus, would represent the women's liberation movement, while Schlafly, founder of Stop ERA (Equal Rights Amendment), would focus on the rejection of the ERA. *The Vidette*, May 1, 1973 (Vol. 85, No. 99, pg. 1).
- Gene Budig, vice president of ISU, was appointed acting president by the Board of Regents. Of note is that Budig was completing his two-week obligation in the Air National Guard during the Board meeting. To be present at the Board meeting, Budig "used his weekend pass to attend the meeting." *The Vidette*, June 22, 1973 (Vol. 86, No. 2, pg. 1).

25 years ago – April/May/June 1998

- Comedian Jeff Foxworthy performed at Braden Auditorium on April 4. The sold-out show featured the comic's stories of family, particularly raising daughters. Foxworthy commented that surrounding towns like McLean and Towanda must be empty because of the sold-out performance, which ultimately prompted him to wear his signature blue Stingray boots. *The Vidette* also noted, "Then he made the usual jokes about being in Normal." *The Daily Vidette*, April 6, 1998 (Vol. 110, No. 138, pg. 9).
- Students in residence halls received word that "internet hook-ups" would be installed in residence halls. Though students no longer needed to go to Milner Library to gain access to the web, Computer User Services used the opportunity to remind users of rules against commercial use: "Students cannot post commercial web sites through ISU's computing resources,

- as stated in the Appropriate Use Policy.” Though only a few instances of misuse were discovered, those who violated the policy faced “termination of employment or student standing.” *The Daily Vidette*, May 1, 1998 (Vol. 110, No. 157, pg. 3).
- David Strand, the 15th president of Illinois State University, announced his retirement on June 30, 1999. A year away, Strand has a list of priorities before his departure: “the potential merger of Mennonite College of Nursing with ISU, the continued implementation of the General Education Program and the third year of Strand’s Salary Equity Program.” *The Summer Vidette*, June 17, 1998 (Vol. 111, No. 1, pg. 1).

Illinois Shakespeare Festival

Illinois Shakespeare Festival (ISF) announced its 2023 repertory season with three artistic offerings, including one Shakespearean comedy, one Shakespearean tragedy, and one contemporary play about the publication of Shakespeare's First Folio. All plays will run

in repertory. Tickets are on sale now.

The season will launch in June 2023 with *The Comedy of Errors*, last performed at the Festival in 2013. One of Shakespeare's earliest plays, *The Comedy of Errors* is a farcical tale of separated twins and mistaken identities. This comedic romp is an ISF favorite that includes madcap bawdiness, love at first sight, unexpected reunions, and happily-ever-afters.

Following will be the ISF premiere of *The Book of Will* by Lauren Gunderson. Gunderson's award-winning *The Book of Will* asks the audience to consider a literary world without Shakespeare's First Folio and the iconic characters contained therein. Set amid the noise and color of 1620s London, *The Book of Will* presents a story of love, loss, and laughter.

The final performance in repertory will be *The Tempest*, last performed at the Festival in 2010 and widely believed to be the final play Shakespeare wrote. The banished noble Prospero harnesses the power of an otherworldly island to conjure a storm and torment the survivors of a shipwreck that includes the King of Naples and Prospero's treacherous brother, Antonio. Prospero seeks revenge but discovers forgiveness and generosity in this tale full of magical spirits.

Patrons can also anticipate other beloved staples of the Illinois Shakespeare Festival experience including a Theatre for Young Audiences (TYA) production, Summer Camps for Youth, the annual John Stevens Memorial Golf Outing on Monday, June 19, and the unforgettable end of season Bard Bash and Cabaret on Sunday, August 6.

Inaugural philanthropy awards presented at Gratitude Gala

On March 25 at its inaugural Gratitude Gala for donors in the 1857 Society, Illinois State University presented three awards to recognize donors’ outstanding philanthropic achievement.

“We welcome you here tonight to celebrate your investment in the University, which continues to grow stronger each day. Illinois State has gained its strong reputation because we share a common goal: ensuring the success of our students,” said Interim President Aondover Tarhule. “I appreciate your investments in our future. They bring dreams to reality, aspirations to fruition, and make the impossible, possible.”

The three awards honor the University’s greatest ambassadors, who through their own generosity, motivate others to give back and enable Illinois State to move boldly forward.

Redbird Philanthropist Award

Jim ’74 and Carole Mounier ’75

The Redbird Philanthropist Award recognizes an individual or couple who demonstrates outstanding civic responsibility to Illinois State University through voluntary commitment of their time, talent, and financial contributions. Recipients of this award have also served in leadership roles, provided vision, and involved others in philanthropic activity.

Having transferred to Illinois State, Jim and Carole Mounier met through Greek life. After reconnecting with their alma mater in 2007 during an alumni event in Rockford, they established the Mounier Golf Scholarship, which is awarded annually to a student-athlete from the men’s or women’s golf teams. In 2012, the Mouniers generously contributed toward construction of the golf training center’s first phase, and in 2014, committed the largest single

gift commitment in Illinois State University history. In recognition of the couple’s generosity, the golf training center was named the Jim and Carole Mounier Golf Training Facility at Weibring Golf Club.

The Mouniers’ belief that participation in sports builds character and leads to success motivates their desire to give back. The Mouniers have demonstrated an unwavering commitment to bettering the University, today and into the future.

Innovation in Philanthropy Award

Kay Wilson ’63

The Innovation in Philanthropy Award recognizes a donor who demonstrates creativity in their philanthropic efforts. Such donors have established a new initiative, expanded the University’s reach, or benefitted a new discipline.

Local philanthropist Kay Wilson graduated from Illinois State with a degree in mathematics and earned a master’s degree from the University of Illinois before pursuing a career at State Farm Insurance Cos. and teaching part time at Illinois State. Her husband, Dr. Thomas D. Wilson, served Illinois State for 31 years as an accomplished professor in the Politics and Government Department.

In 2002, Thomas established a scholarship for political science majors performing public service internships. Thomas and Kay were inducted into the College of Arts and Sciences Hall of Fame in 2012. Thomas sadly passed away in October 2017, but in 2020, Kay honored his love of learning by creating the Thomas D. Wilson Scholarship for Milner Library student workers. Kay has also founded the Kay B. Wilson Scholarship for future math educators, the Wilson Family Model United Nations Endowment, and the Wilson Family Student Assistance Fund to provide for students experiencing temporary financial hardship or need.

Kay was also an early supporter of Mennonite College of Nursing’s Springfield location, which seeks to increase the college’s capacity to educate more future nurses in Central Illinois. In 2018, Kay expanded her support to include funding for community college students pursuing nursing education as part of the University’s dual enrollment program. Her most recent philanthropic endeavor supports retention and success of mathematics students through teaching-related faculty development, peer mentorship, and tutoring.

Above and Beyond Philanthropist Award

Drs. Carson and Iris Varner

The Above and Beyond Philanthropist Award recognizes an Illinois State University faculty or staff member who, in their philanthropic support of Illinois State, has gone above and beyond their professional role at the University to have an even greater impact. This year's recipients have devoted their lives to enhancing the University and leading its students.

Longtime faculty members Drs. Carson and Iris Varner arrived at Illinois State in 1975. They were inspired by the global business tied to Illinois' corn and soybean farms and decided to create an international business major at Illinois State. They created the interdisciplinary major and minor and graduated the first contract major in 1981.

In recognizing the importance of study abroad opportunities for international business students, they established connections with universities abroad, including partners in Angers, France, and Paderborn, Germany. In 2009, they established the Carson and Iris Varner International Business Experience Fund. In 2018, the Varners stepped up to donate \$1 million to expand the International Business Institute, which was introduced in 2008 and housed the international business major and minor. The newly transformed space was named the Carson and Iris Varner International Business Institute.

Over the years, the Varners have grown their philanthropy, donating funds to create the Founders Day bell used in Illinois State's annual ceremonies, funding the addition of a world clock and map in the State Farm Hall of Business, and contributing to funds that built the theatre on the grounds of Ewing Manor.

The 2023 award recipients represent just a few of the many generous donors who make up the University's 1857 Society. Together, 1857 Society donors have contributed more than \$98 million in gifts and commitments and more than \$78.8 million in estate or deferred gift commitments.

In his closing remarks at the Gratitude Gala, Vice President for University Advancement Pat Vickerman thanked attendees for their support.

"Tonight we celebrate everyone in this room, for your selfless and generous support that provides the promise of an outstanding ISU experience for our talented and deserving students," Vickerman said. "We are profoundly grateful for your investment in Illinois State, for fueling our success, and inspiring our students, faculty, and staff to 'Gladly Learn and Teach.'"

SUAA Foundation scholarships and grants

The SUAA Foundation now offers up to six scholarships of up to \$1,000 per scholarship annually. The scholarships are awarded for

use in accredited degree-seeking programs, eligible technical/trade programs, and eligible certificate programs. The applicant must be an SUAA member in good standing or the spouse/partner, child, or grandchild of an SUAA member in good standing. In addition, the SUAA Foundation offers up to two grants of up to \$1,000 per grant annually for professional development activities (travel expenses are excluded). The applicant must be an SUAA member in good standing who is currently employed at an Illinois institution of higher education.
