Our ISU Annuitants Association Annual Meeting and election was held in June at the Alumni Center. We are grateful to **University Advancement Vice President Pat Vickerman**, who delivered an exciting presentation about Redbirds Rising: The Campaign for Illinois State University, which has gone beyond the initial goal of \$150 Million. Vickerman emphasized the regular and consistent giving to the campaign by faculty, students, staff, retirees, alumni, and friends of the University, expressing gratitude and emphasizing the importance of each gift regardless of size.

This annual meeting included a vote led by Larry Alferink for proposed changes in the ISUAA bylaws to make them consistent with new changes in the SUAA bylaws. The approved changes provide for a representative to be selected from the Academic Senate, the Civil Service Council, and the Administrative Professional Council to serve on the ISUAA Executive Board. The new SUAA bylaws and ISUAA bylaws may be accessed on each website.

Regarding the election, nominating committee chair George Tuttle presented the slate of candidates and opened nominations from the floor. Roger Cann was re-elected as vice-president, and Neil Gridley was re-elected as treasurer. Jan Cook and Marie Dawson were elected again as directors. Continuing in their positions are Gail Lamb as president, Maureen Peel as secretary, and directors Gary Fish and Victoria F. Harris.

Also at the meeting, the ISUAA Executive Board Awards Committee presented the **Distinguished Service Award** to Tuttle, in appreciation of his many years of service to ISUAA, including a term as president from 1996-1998. Thank you, George!

As president, I reported on major successes during the past year, among them being the establishment of a separate membership committee that has helped ISUAA welcome 87 new members since September of 2018. Several related endeavors led to our ISUAA chapter being one of five chapters in the state to receive a membership initiative award at the annual SUAA June meetings in Springfield. Bravo to all! How Time Flies

150 years ago – 1869

- At the annual meeting of the Board of Education, Richard Edwards opened the session with a report on the state of the university:
“The present condition of the University is so nearly the same as it was one year ago, that it seems hardly necessary to make a full statement of it. We have raised, somewhat, the standard of scholarship since that time, but with no diminution in our numbers. All the members of the long-tried Faculty are retained, and the increase of appropriation made by the last legislature has enabled you to add two to the number. Of the former instructors nothing need be said. They are thoroughly known to you, and their efficiency has been tried. But of the two last appointed a word may be appropriate. And it gives me pleasure to bear unqualified testimony to their faithfulness and efficiency. Their labors have been in a high degree satisfactory to all concerned, and they enjoy the respect and esteem of the students. It is the determination of the entire board of instructors to give the institution as high a degree of efficiency as they possibly can, and with the present increased facilities they have good hope of increasing materially its usefulness and fame.” *Proceedings of the Board of Education of the State of Illinois*, Meeting Minutes, December 15, 1869, pages 3-4.

100 years ago – September/October, 1919

- Ten new teachers joined the faculty of ISNU, including Jennie Whitten, head of foreign languages. Douglas Clay Ridgley, Elmer Cavins, and Eleanor Sheldon returned to their duties upon their return from the war. *The Vidette*, September 6, 1919 (Vol. 32, No 1, pages 1-2)
- In a section called “SEC says,” the writer muses: “We supposed every one is well pleased with the decorations in the auditorium, but we can’t help but think a thought of sympathy for the sparrows that nested therein all summer. Decorators must be a heartless lot, for upon investigation we could not find hair nor hide of the bird’s former abode.” *The Vidette*, October 1, 1919 (Vol. 32, No 4): 5.

75 years ago – August/September, 1944

- *The Vidette* reported that “Navy men prefer hot dogs to dainty ham salad sandwiches, according to the ISNU Canteen corps. The men also prefer the informality of eating their weekly snacks in the home economics laboratory kitchen to being served.” *The Vidette*, August 2, 1944 (Vol. 56, No 35): 1.
- With the lack of a marching band due to war, the university supported the idea of an all-female marching band. Seventy-five members were needed, and a call in *The Vidette* asked for women who could play instruments. When asked, Dr. Richard Browne replied, “ISNU needs a marching band! What would football games, hobo parades, V-day be without a marching band?” *The Vidette*, September 27, 1944 (Vol. 57, No 1): 1.

- *The Vidette* highlighted six veterans who were some of the first to use the newly enacted GI Bill. One of the six was a woman, Mary J. Bartlet, “She was a member of the women’s reserve of the marine corps from August, 1943, to July, 1944. Since the bill provides that each veteran is entitled to one full year of college work plus one extra day of college for each day in the service, she is entitled to one year, 10 months and 28 days of schooling.” *The Vidette*, October 4, 1944 (Vol. 57, No 2): 1.

50 years ago – September/October, 1969

- Former ISU basketball star and assistant to president Braden, Dr. Kenneth A. Shaw, announced his acceptance of the position of acting dean of the college at Towson State College. During his tenure at ISU, Shaw headed the High Potential Student Program, was the director of Dunn Hall, and was an instructor in education. *The Vidette*, September 16, 1969 (Vol. 82, No 6): 2.
- The Music Department added two new masters degrees to their program: the Master of Music and Master of Music Education. The National Association of Schools of Music “strongly recommended” the programs to help prepare music teachers for their eventual classrooms. *The Vidette*, October 2, 1969 (Vol. 82, No 11): 5.
- Museum Director Dr. Cecilia Bunny expanded the five university museum’s schedules and programs to accommodate a growing educational need on-campus and in the community. The five museum spaces included the Funk Rock Museum, located in the basement of Cook Hall; the Eyestone School schoolhouse, located off of Adelaide; the Huddleson Agriculture Museum, located off of North Main Street in Normal; the Natural Science displays located in Milner Library; and the Stevenson Memorial Room located in Stevenson Hall. *The Vidette*, October 7, 1969 (Vol. 82, No 12): 3.

25 years ago – August/September/October, 1994

- *The Daily Vidette* moved from its location in the Edwards Annex to a new building located at the corner of University and Locust streets. While the old building was torn down to make way for an expansion at the Physical Plant, the new building “contains a conference room and will be furnished with new, modular furniture” as well as ample parking for visitors and staff. *The Daily Vidette*, August 18, 1994 (Vol. 107, No 8, Section B): 17.
- The Big Red Marching Machine played during halftime in Chicago at the Bears opening game on September 4. The six-and-a-half minute show featured the George Gershwin song, “I’ve got Rhythm,” along with other patriotic pieces. Near the end of the number, “the ISU Danceline suspended giant American flags parallel to the field while the medley finished with two small cannons which shot red, white, and blue streamers high above the stadium.” As the band exited, they played the Bears fight song, “Bear Down, Chicago Bears.” *The Daily Vidette*, September 6, 1994 (Vol. 107, No 19): 1, 6
- The Town of Normal held the grand reopening for the Normal Theatre on October 7. After a dedication ceremony, three films were shown: the short film *Mr. Bean Goes to the Premier*, the short film *Water, Water, Every Hare*, and the feature film

Singin' in the Rain. The Daily Vidette, October 10, 1994 (Vol. 107, No 43): 1, 6)

Report from SUAA Annual Statewide Meeting, June 27 and 28, 2019

The Board of Directors held the SUAA Annual Meeting in Springfield at the Abraham Lincoln Hotel. In addition to several speakers and reports from officers and committee chairs, the primary item of business was to consider a significant amendment to the SUAA bylaws.

Speakers

There were four speakers who addressed a variety of topics. Over lunch, we heard a presentation by a freshman legislator (Representative Mike Murphy from Springfield) about what it was like to join the legislature compared to what he expected it to be like. As a private citizen, he had spent most of his life working as a businessman and ran for office planning to spend most of his time on the issue of the business climate in Illinois. In reality, he only spends maybe 5 percent of his time on this issue. He was surprised about how many bills were introduced into the house (6,000), how little time he actually had to consider a bill before it came to a vote on the floor, and how little time he got to spend on his reason for running for office.

Amanda Kass made a presentation on the so-called “pension crisis,” noting that it wasn’t a crisis at all, and how poorly many members of the media and sometimes members of the legislature understood this issue.

Daisy Contreras, an NPR reporter, provided her observations about the bills that were approved this legislative session and what they might portend for the future.

Martin Noven and Kristen Houch made a presentation on new SURS initiatives, focusing on the new buyouts for individuals who will retire over the next several years, the risks of choosing to participate in the new buyout program, and that such buyouts are not for everyone and should be approached with considerable caution. Noven also provided some information about changes they are hoping to approve to make for individuals in the self-managed plan.

Bylaws amendments

As background, the SUAA Board of Directors can be as large as 135 individuals if everyone eligible to vote were to attend. At the Fall 2018 SUAA Board meeting, an attorney with special expertise

in Nonprofit organizations such as SUAA expressed surprise at the unusual size of the Board. Most Boards are between 10 and 20 individuals. He also reviewed the legal liabilities that directors potentially could face and that it would be prohibitively expensive for SUAA to buy liability insurance for every member of the Board, if it could even be obtained. His presentation was followed by the resignation of one member of the Board who was unwilling to face that risk. At the end of that meeting, Chuck McGuire, chair of the bylaws committee and a member of the ISUAA chapter, made a motion that the bylaws committee should be charged with amending the bylaws to reduce the legal liability for directors by reducing the decisions the Board would make. Instead they would make recommendations on many items of business to the executive committee, which would then make the decision and assume the liability. The 10 members of the executive committee are covered by liability insurance. There was an amendment to increase the representation of the Board on the bylaws committee, and 10 members on a subcommittee to work on this task were added to the five members of the standing committee.

The committee worked very hard during the year and presented the SUAA Board with a proposed revision to the bylaws that changes the Board of Directors to a house of delegates and the executive committee to the new Board of Directors. With the exception of a few specific tasks, only the new Board of Directors could approve many items of business. The house of delegates did retain authority to elect officers and regional directors, to amend the bylaws and to approve the legislative platform.

There were several amendments introduced. The most significant of these required the Board to obtain approval from the house of delegates on the annual budget and of any dues increases, as is currently the case. While this would expose delegates to legal liability if they did not pass a budget, or refused to pass a budget adequate to pay SUAA's financial obligations, this amendment narrowly passed by a margin of two votes. With the addition of several other minor changes, the proposed bylaws revision was approved. and SUAA now has a revised structure more in line with the practices of many other organizations. Our congratulations to **Chuck McGuire** for a lot of hard work and for his incredible leadership in guiding this revision to a successful end!

Miller establishes fund for professional development

Catherine Miller, emeritus associate dean for academics for the Mennonite College of Nursing (MCN), is raising up both students

and faculty through the establishment of the Dr. H. Catherine Miller Fund for Non-Tenured Track Faculty. A pledge and bequest commitment totaling \$32,500 created the new fund during Redbirds Rising: The Campaign for Illinois State.

A graduate of St. John's Hospital nursing program, Miller was serving as associate dean and director of the nursing program at Heartland Community College when Janet Krecji, then dean of MCN, asked Miller to consider a position with MCN. After the two spoke, Miller knew she needed to pursue the unique ideas and opportunities Krecji promised at Illinois State.

"I always push myself to do something different, and I loved Janet's ideas and what she had in mind for Mennonite," Miller said. "I found great faculty to work with, administrators who were committed, and the fulfillment of knowing that we were changing the lives of students as well as patients."

Miller noticed that the individuals who seemed to have the largest impact on undergraduate students in the program were their non-tenure track faculty instructors. During her time as associate dean for academics, she discovered there was not much funding to support these faculty, and subsequently established the Dr. H. Catherine Miller Fund for Non-Tenured Track Faculty. "I thought in retirement I would do something to specifically help students by supporting non-tenure instructors, who are crucial to the success of the baccalaureate nursing program," Miller said. That's why Miller structured her fund to help non-tenure track faculty attend conferences, receive hands-on experience with the latest technological developments in health care, and experience learning activities to

Without them, students wouldn’t receive the inspiration to look for things that are new and different.” Miller’s investment in Redbirds Rising will impact the lives of faculty, students, and patients by ensuring that faculty have the means to provide students a diverse and holistic learning experience.

Recalling MCN’s recent 100th anniversary celebration, MCN Dean Judy Neubrander spoke to the critical role financial gifts will play in the continued success of MCN’s program. “Alumni and friends who give back are paving the way for the next 100 years of MCN,” Neubrander said. “Thanks to their contributions, the future is bright for both the college and the advancement of health care.”
