## **President's message**

#### Membership and Outreach

As we near the close of the academic year (and the ISU Annuitants' year), it is time to stand back and reflect a little on the progress (and lack thereof) that has occurred over the past 12 months.

On the state political front, it would be perhaps easier simply to reprint some of the articles and reflections from last year. The state still has no budget; the General Assembly and the governor are still at loggerheads; and students, faculty, and retirees are in a state of growing uncertainty. By the time this newsletter is published, a second year's budget should be nearing completion. While this is being written around March 1, my bet is nothing will be happening by May either.

What is clear is that public higher education in Illinois, and those of us who have spent our careers and lives working for its success, will continue to hurt. The lack of both a budget and respect by our elected representatives is beginning to have serious effects on our institutions, our students, and on us. What was once one of the pre-eminent systems in the country, both at the flagship level and below, is now in serious danger of becoming second-rate. Even if "star" programs continue to succeed, it could be at the expense of the meat and potatoes programs that form the backbone of student education. Some institutions are threatening to completely close; others must consider draconian cuts. And there is no end in sight.

Parenthetically, it is interesting to note that in a study by Ralph Martire and the Center for Tax and Budget Accountability, corporate officers listed both "infrastructure" and "an educated workforce" far above "low taxes" as a reason for investing corporate resources and locating a business in a state.

Parents are rightly asking whether it is worth the gamble to send their daughters and sons to some Illinois universities. Will they graduate? On time? Will financial aid be available? Will they get the courses they need? Will their degrees be worth as much as those in other states? Most of all, will students receive the respect they deserve from Springfield? Increasingly, the answer is no, and those parents are sending their sons and daughters to private schools or out of state, where more forward-looking states are welcoming our brightest kids with open arms (and financial aid packages). And increasingly, those kids never return to Illinois, thus draining one of our chief economic resources.

One thing we can do, of course, is to do our own lobbying. SUAA and ISUAA are, of course, dedicated to lobbying for our members and for our retirement systems. But we also care deeply about our institutions and about higher ed in general. We can assist both through our work and through our lobbyists. But that depends on how strong we are perceived to be by the politicians in Springfield.

It is important that for our political power we have two things: people and money. It is critical that the political powers see us as representing significant numbers of people (read: VOTES). Memberships are critical. Please continue to renew your memberships, of course, but if you know people who should be members, please talk to them. Membership materials are on our websites at Annuitants.IllinoisState.edu. Please remember, YOU DON'T HAVE TO BE RETIRED TO BE A MEMBER. In fact, many of our members are still working.

#### **How Time Flies**

#### 150 years ago—1866

• The title of 'Principal' is officially changed to 'President.' A resolution by board member Judge W.H. Green read: "Resolved, That the Principal of the Normal University be hereafter officially known and called 'President' and that the principal male teachers thereof be known and called 'Professors.'" Proceedings of the Board of Education of the State of Illinois, Meeting Minutes, June 27-28, 1866, page 1.

#### 100 years ago—June, 1916

- The partnership between ISNU and the Illinois Soldiers and Sailors School (then called the Soldiers Orphans Home) was made official at a recent Board of Education meeting. The University, desperately needing training space, planned to place a critics teacher and four student teachers at the school within the home in order to teach the growing number of children living at the facility. At the time, home housed almost 400 children. *The Vidette*, March 22, 1916 (Vol. 28, No. 26, page 1).
- The Department of Commerce announced plans for the second annual shorthand and typewriting contest. The event, held for the first time the previous year, brought 100 contestants from around the region. To accommodate an even larger group of contestants, the department created eight events consisting of shorthand and diction, timed typing, and typing for accuracy. *The Vidette*, March 29, 1916 (Vol. 28, No. 27, page 1-2).

#### 75 years ago—June 1941

- A branch of the national association, the American Children's Education, was established by students enrolled in elementary curriculum. The 15-member panel held its first meeting on April 1. *The Vidette*, March 21, 1941 (Vol. 53, No. 42, page 1).
- Rules for use of the student lounge are put in place and included the following: "Dancing in the lounge is not permitted at any time"; "Cards should only be played in the card rooms"; "Ink should only be used at the desks"; and "No one should sit on tables or chair arms." *The Vidette*, March 25, 1941 (Vol. 53, No. 43, page 1, 4).
- Cornelius Vanderbilt Jr., great-great grandson of Cornelius Vanderbilt, spoke in Capen Auditorium on April 1. His talk was controversial in nature as he made bold statements and predictions about foreign leaders and the United States' eventual involvement in the ongoing world war. Observers noted that, "He predicted that the future of the United States was encompassed within two notes reportedly handed to our government yesterday by two foreign powers." The Vidette, April 1, 1941 (Vol. 53, No. 45, page 1).

#### 50 years ago—March 1966

- Local folk singers The Innsiders performed at The Cage's first ever jam session. Attendee Judy Franke commented, "I think these boys are really going places." *The Vidette*, March 8, 1966 (Vol. 78, No. 41, page 1).
- The 33rd annual Blackfriars show premiered on March 17 at Capen Auditorium. The student group, known for its original satirical humor, promised audiences "something to offend everyone" that would poke fun at "students, administration, community, motherhood, 'truth, justice, and the American way' and even Batman." *The Vidette*, March 17, 1966 (Vol. 78, No. 44, page 1).
- Much to the delight of students, the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra performed as the headline act at the annual Big Four dance. *The Vidette*, March 22, 1966 (Vol. 78, No. 45, page 3).

#### 25 years ago—March 1991

- As a participant in the Trading Places program, student Daniel Cress accompanied President Thomas Wallace throughout the day on March 12. Their roles were switched, and Wallace followed Cress throughout the day on March 15. *The Daily Vidette*, March 13, 1991 (Vol. 103, No. 117, page 1, 9).
- Members of the Delta Delta Delta sorority learned that a child they had met on their spring break vacation in Cancun a year earlier was successfully reunited with his mother. The child, kidnapped by his father from North Carolina, had been living with his father in secret in Cancun. The sorority members met the boy on the beach as he snorkeled with his friends. After a few hours of conversation, the sorority members realized the boy's situation and alerted authorities when they arrived back on campus. After a yearlong investigation and using the information provided by the sorority members, the boy was returned to his mother in North Carolina. *The Daily Vidette*, March 19, 1991 (Vol. 103, No. 121, page 1, 3).
