How time flies

150 years ago—1872

The Illinois Natural History Museum curator John Wesley
Powell resigned at the Board of Education meeting on June
26, 1872. Samuel Moulton appointed Jesse Fell, Enoch Gatsman, and Charles Noetling as the committee commissioned
to nominate the next Museum curator.

100 years ago—January-March 1922

- The junior class was said to be 'seriously considering' a play written by University High School alumni and former Bloomington resident Rachel Crothers. 39 East gained popularity in New York and Chicago and became a popular film starring Constance Binny. Though a strong contender, the junior class was still in deliberations and reported to The Vidette, "More will be said of the play in a later issue." The Vidette, January 11, 1922 (Vol. 34, No. 16, pg 3).
- Maude Kettering, the first matron of Fell Hall, died February 10 after a fall in the women's dormitory. Upon the news of her February 5 hospitalization, a dance planned at Fell Hall that night was canceled. Her funeral was held on February 11 in the living room of Fell Hall, the third funeral ever held on campus. *The Vidette*, February 8, 1922 (Vol. 34, Nos. 20, pg 3); February 15, 1922 (Vol. 34, Nos. 21, Pg 1 and 4).
- During a student body session, President Felmley asked all Juniors who planned to return the next year to stand. Two hundred twenty-nine students were recognized, while 202 were slated for graduation that semester. These students represented the largest graduating classes to date at the University. The Vidette, March 22, 1922 (Vol. 34, No. 25, Pg 1).

75 years ago—January-March 1947

- Twenty-five families and 42 men moved into the brand new housing complex for student veterans off Suddath Road. The barrack-style housing, constructed under the Landham Act, provided "housing for distressed veterans, servicemen, and their families who are attending educational institutions." The housing was shipped in and constructed by the federal government while the institution provided the location, provided utilities, and roadways. *The Vidette*, January 29, 1947 (Vol. 59, No. 14, pg 1).
- The new semester saw 1,677 students enroll at the University. Of that, 606 students were veterans. The number of male students (827) was slightly higher, likely due partly to the increase of service members' discharges from the military. *The Vidette*, February 5, 1947 (Vol. 59, No. 15, pg 1).

50 years ago-January-March 1972

• In a letter to the editor, "Debbie" voiced support for changing dormitory guest visitation windows to 24 hours. Debbie pointed to the University's move to coed dormitories;

- allowing visitors at any hour would enable students time to adjust to coed living. As Debbie argued, "It isn't fair to have restrictions on some dorm's guest hours and not others—there should be the same opportunity for all students, not just those in coed dorms." *The Vidette*, January 11, 1972 (Vol. 84, No. 36, pg 4).
- President Berlo nominated Gene Budig as the new vice president and dean of the University. If approved by the Board of Regents, Budig would be the first to serve in the revamped role of dean of the University. After the resignation of Richard Bond from his role as dean of faculty, Berlo redesigned the position. With his expected approval by the Board of Regents, Budig was scheduled to start his duties on June 1. *The Vidette*, February 15th, 1970 (Vol. 84, No. 41, pg 1-2).
- Phil Stephen and Jim Manis of the UNITY party won the ISU Student Government elections as president and vice president. Stephen won with 2,225 votes, while Manis won with 2,215 votes out of 4,144 votes. The student body that year totaled over 17,000. The computer that tallied the votes completed its task with a note to the victors: "Congratulations to the winners, have fun don't work too hard the result is calculated by me, supercomputer third generation. Winning the election, however, is the responsibility of the candidate." *The Vidette*, March 2, 1970 (Vol. 84, No. 47, Pg 1).

25 years ago-January-March 1997

• To fund new campus construction and renovations, the University proposed a student fee increase between \$100 and \$129 a year. The fees would pay down, over time, \$42 million in bonds that would fund the construction of a new parking deck, the construction of the Performing Arts Center, and the renovations of some residence halls. The student referendum passed on February 13, 1997—that year's observance of Founders Day.

SUAA Fall Meeting

The Fall SUAA House of Delegates Meeting was held November 17 at the Alumni Center. The Bylaws require that the proposed budget for 2022 be approved at this meeting and that the delegates also approve an update to the SUAA Legislative Platform. SUAA is in good financial condition currently, due in part to limited in-person meetings due to COVID-19. The 2022 budget was approved with a projected budget surplus. The updated Legislative Platform was approved after some discussion and is posted on the SUAA website.

Mike Maloney, the SUAA lobbyist, made a presentation on the redistricting process, the changes in the legislative seats for each party, and what it might mean for SUAA. At the time of the presentation, the new legislative map for the state was in court to resolve challenges on constitutional issues and minority representation for the Metro East districts near St. Louis and in Chicago. Due to redistricting issues related to the delayed release of the 2021 census data, the state primary election has been moved from March to June 28. Thus, the legislative calendar will be shortened to allow members to campaign before the primary election.

As a department of Illinois State University, TechZone offers discounts and buying assistance to all members of the University community—including annuitants—for personal computers, tablets, software, and supplies. It also offers walk-up computer, smartphone, and general tech support. Major vendor partners continue to be Apple, Dell, Lenovo, and Microsoft. TechZone can help you purchase everything from complete computer systems to headphones, and then, perform onsite Apple, HP, Dell, and Lenovo hardware warranty repairs.

While we want to see you in person, many services are available remotely. To shop online at any time, visit <u>TechZone.IllinoisState.</u>
edu (an active University Login ID (ULID) and password are required). We also can schedule personalized Zoom sessions with staff for personal buying assistance. Note: University technology help is also available via phone through the Technology Support Center at (309) 438-HELP.

Hours during the semester are typically 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Thursday with slightly reduced hours on Fridays and open on many Saturdays. As things fluctuate with the academic calendar, check out the TechZone website before making a trip to campus. Illinois Shakespeare Festival (ISF) announced its 45th anniversary season with a trifecta of artistic offerings, including one Shakespearean comedy, one Shakespearean tragedy, and one modern favorite.

The season will launch with the long-awaited return of *The Complete Works of William Shakespeare (abridged)* by Adam Long, Daniel Singer, and Jess Winfield at the beautiful outdoor Ewing Theatre. Estate gift commitment honors twin sisters' art legacies

A recent estate gift commitment from Art Professor Emerita Dr. Susan Amster will further the study of art at Illinois State University. The gift honors her twin sister, Stephanie Amster, who died at age 80 on February 12, 2021. Both sisters created a legacy of teaching and inspiring as art faculty members at Illinois State.

Stephanie earned a bachelor's and master's in fine art from the University of Texas in 1962 and 1968. Susan earned a bachelor's in art from the University of Texas in 1962, a master's in art from East Texas State in 1968, and a Ph.D. in education from the University of Texas in 1972.

Stephanie found a job teaching junior high in New York in 1963. Susan moved to Dallas to teach elementary school. It was the first time the twins had ever lived apart.

The twins later moved into higher education as Stephanie was hired to teach art education at Illinois State.

After finishing her dissertation, Susan joined Stephanie in Normal. "I snuck in on Stephanie's coattails. She did everything well, so I just followed her," said Susan with a laugh. "It worked out well for me."

Susan taught future elementary teachers how to include art in their classrooms. Stephanie took on a broader course load, including classes in 2D and 3D design. She later taught computer graphics and established a study abroad program for the art department in Florence, Italy, her favorite city.

Perhaps Stephanie's most notable achievement was the creation of an arts festival at Ewing Manor in 1972, for which she personally fundraised for 18 years. She remained an influential figure in local and national art communities until her passing in 2021.

"Stephanie had 30 wonderful years at ISU. I had 28. We thought we would like to continue contributing in some way," said Susan.

The Stephanie H. Amster Design Scholarship was established in Stephanie's honor in 1982 to reward students who exemplify leadership, academic proficiency, art talent, and a commitment to excellence in art.

After Stephanie died, Susan decided to expand upon her sister's investment.

New provisions in Susan's estate plans will enhance Stephanie's existing scholarship. It's her way of honoring Stephanie's many years of dedication to the Ewing Arts Festival.

Additional funds from Susan's estate will create a scholarship for art education majors with preference given to students who demonstrate financial need, creative thinking ability, dynamic teaching potential, and a humanitarian philosophy.

"My favorite quote is: 'Art is the root, and life is the flower," said Susan. With her gift, she strengthens already deep roots at Illinois State in hopes students grow through their love of art.
