#### **How time flies**

#### 150 years ago-1872

Jesse Fell reported to the Board:

"That the University Farm, containing about 90 acres, had been leased to F.K. Phoenix, for five years, from April 1, 1872, for \$350 per year, payable December 1 of each year."

The report did not include additional information about how the University would manage training on the farm around the company. The annual lease equaled roughly \$7,900 in 2022.

Proceedings of the Board of Education of the State of Illinois, Meeting Minutes, December 5 and 6, 1871, pg 5-6.

#### 100 years ago-November - December 1922

- The first student chapter of the Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA), founded at Illinois State Normal University, celebrated its 50th anniversary. Festivities included communal gatherings, banquets, and a program that featured the organization's national secretary, Oolooah Burner. *The Vidette*, November 1, 1922 (Vol. 35, No. 8, pg 1).
- The second annual Homecoming was held and reported to be a success. Along with a play by the Jesters, YWCA, and Varsity club banquets, a special guest joined the festivities. The "elder daughter" of second president Richard Edwards (Ellen Edwards) attended and participated in activities for the University's literary societies, Wrightonian and Philadelphian. (*The Vidette*, November 15, 1922 (Vol. 35, No. 10, pg 1).
- President Felmley announced plans to advocate for funds to build new campus facilities. Building requests included a new gymnasium, a new hall of science, an addition for Fell Hall, and "domestic science cottages," what would eventually become Rambo House. The estimated cost for the new facilities topped \$600,000, the equivalent of over \$10.5 million today. *The Vidette*, December 20, 1921 (Vol. 35, No. 14, pg 1 and 4).

#### 75 years ago-November - December 1947

- Vidette reporter Betty McDaniels scouted the library to investigate how many students sleep in the library. Her survey revealed that the sleeping network of students "maybe found infiltrated throughout the north and south reserve rooms, in the upstairs reading room, and particularly in the browsing room." While 50% downstairs and 75% upstairs are found sleeping, 99.44% nap in the browsing room. According to McDaniels, first period, fifth period, and late evening hours are when to find more sleeping students in the library. The Vidette, November 6, 1947 (Vol. 60, No. 8, pg 4).
- Wives of married male students planned an initial meeting to start a club. The call, in the form of 200 postcards to married women of ISNU students, cited the need for fellowship and knowledge-sharing among members. Many men who returned from WWII were at the University using their GI Bill

- funds: "As wives of future teachers, these young women know they will be expected to participate in community affairs, and they plan that the club's program will provide information and experience which will equip them to do this." *The Vidette*, November 19, 1947 (Vol. 60, No. 10, pg 1).
- Several holiday events were planned before the campus
   "exodus" at the end of the month. Among them, the Women's Recreation Association sponsored the Kris Kringle Ball,
   and the Women's League and U Club presented programs in
   Capen Auditorium. *The Vidette*, December 19, 1947 (Vol. 60 –
   misprint 59, No. 13, pg 1).

#### 50 years ago-November - December 1972

- Students prepared to deliver the first edition of the *Index*, the magazine replacing the former university yearbook *The Index*. The change came amid rising costs to publish an annual book and lack of interest by the student body in purchasing a costly publication. Assistant Editor Larry Lottino explained that students needed to forget the old yearbook and embrace the new quarterly magazine. *The Vidette*, November 1, 1972 (Vol. 85, No. 26, pg 19).
- Dormitory room rates increased at the November Board of Regents meeting. Students in multiple-occupancy rooms faced a \$30 increase, while those in single occupancy received an increase of \$105. Calls for an additional \$5 each term were not acted on. Supporters cited decreased funds for dorm resident projects which were items many residents strongly advocated. *The Vidette*, November 21, 1972 (Vol. 85, No. 37, pg 1).
- Dr. Charles E. Morris announced the approval of 15 proposals for innovation in the classroom. Of the winners:

  Betsy Parriberg, "adaptation of commercially produced audio tapes to video for the hearing impaired"; Mildred Boaz L.

  Brosnahn, "in-class grading of papers using transparencies";

  Robert Walsh, "video-taping of panels of student, faculty and textbook author for class use." *The Vidette*, December 5, 1972 (Vol. 85, No. 41, pg 8).

#### 25 years ago-November - December 1997

- Members of the Black Writer's Forum held Poetry Night in the Circus Room at the Bone Student Center. Students and faculty members shared stories and creative works describing their lives, experiences, and issues important to them, including racism, diversity, and academic struggles. Students also took advantage of an open mic that invited anyone to share their creative works. *The Daily Vidette*, November 6, 1997 (Vol. 110, No. 65, pg 1).
- Lucia Cordell Getsi, newly named ISU distinguished professor, spoke at the Bone Student Center about the importance of art in society. Getsi spoke on government involvement in removing art and creative endeavors, "They must destroy aloneness, which is the condition of art, the condition in which the mind is focused inward." She also advocated for

- increased art awareness and creation in public schools, saying one poetry reading a year was inadequate. *The Daily Vidette*, November 18, 1996 (Vol. 110, No. 67, pg 3).
- Nine Greek houses participated in "Get Lit for the Holidays," a charitable event sponsored by the CERES sorority and the FarmHouse fraternity. The money raised supported the Y-Me National Breast Cancer Organization and the local chapter of Habitat for Humanity. Judging for the houses included "the enthusiastic members of CERES and FarmHouse" who followed behind the judges' car on a hayrack and sang holiday carols. The top two winners were Phi Sigma Kapp and Sigma Alpha Epsilon. The Daily Vidette, December 3, 1997 (Vol. 110, No. 81, pg 3).



# A royal alumni connection

A reunion on the quad turned into 51 years of companionship, family, and love for the 2022 Homecoming alumni king and queen, John '69 and Marilyn (Mueller) Freese '70.

The couple initially met during John's senior year when he served as chairman of the ISU Student Senate. Marilyn worked as a



clerk for the Student Senate Office, and the two would make small conversation. John graduated that semester with a political science degree and entered law school in the fall. It wasn't until he returned for a campus visit the following year that their friendship blossomed. He ran into Marylin on the quad as she studied for her senior finals and prepared to graduate with her elementary education degree. Before her graduation, they had their first date and continued regular visits for a year until they married in 1971.

It was no surprise it took the couple so long to meet as both stayed busy with their academics, extracurriculars, and volunteering around the community. Along with serving on Student Senate and various honor societies, John was appointed as one of two students to the committee drafting the new ISU constitution for faculty and students. He remembers the time spent as a dear memory along with being named one of the first four Bone Scholars in 1967 with the honor recognized by President Robert Bone himself. Marilyn built lifelong friendships as she participated in residence hall activities including being a floor representative for her hall's judicial council. Along with her job with Student Senate, she worked for the Feeney Dining Center and volunteered at the Western Avenue Community Center.

After graduations and a wedding, John earned his law degree, and the couple moved to California where John served as an attorney for the United States Navy. The couple returned to Bloomington-Normal four years later with their first child. John started at a private practice while Marilyn raised their three children. Once their youngest started school, Marilyn taught for Unit 5 school district. John became an associate circuit court judge, and 10 years later, he was elected as a circuit court judge. He retired in 2004 as chief judge of the Eleventh Judicial Circuit, with Marilyn fully retiring from teaching a year later.

Following retirement, the couple volunteers with several community organizations. They enjoy the time they get to spend with their three children, seven grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren, several of whom reside in Bloomington-Normal. They serve on the University's community partners committee, enjoy evenings at the Illinois Shakespeare Festival, and were members of Redbirds Rising: The Campaign for Illinois State national committee. They give extensive praise to the University for providing them the education, connections, and values that make them who they are today. To be sure others have the opportunities they had at ISU, the couple established a scholarship within the Department of Politics and Government, and they continue to support several other areas of Illinois State including the University's Horticulture Center and WGLT.

# Welcome desk honors president emeritus and former first lady

President Emeritus Dr. Larry H. Dietz and Marlene Dietz were honored for their longtime dedication to Illinois State on August 26, 2022, with the unveiling of the Dr. Larry and Marlene Dietz Welcome Desk. The welcome desk is located within the Bone Student Center, which was renovated during Dietz's presidency.

"It is very fitting that the welcome desk in this space is named for Larry and Marlene Dietz, as they are very gracious and welcoming people and have been wonderful ambassadors of Illinois State University," said Illinois State President Terri Goss Kinzy, Ph.D.

Larry Dietz joined Illinois State University in 2011 as vice president for Student Affairs. He became the University's 19th president in 2014 and served in that role until his retirement in 2021. Many milestones were achieved during the Dietz administration, and his time was highlighted by the development of a new cybersecurity degree, the planning and approvals for a College of Engineering, and funding secured for the Wonsook Kim College of Fine Arts during a historic fundraising campaign that raised more than \$180 million. Dietz's student-first, values-based leadership undergirded his presidency and commitment to the University.

As first lady, Marlene Dietz enriched the campus with her warm presence and servant leadership. She actively took part in fundraising and friend-raising events with a tireless commitment to the Redbird community.

Larry and Marlene Dietz spoke at the gathering, expressing gratitude for the honor.

## Author and historian Greg Koos to speak at Holiday Luncheon

Join us December 7 as we welcome former director of the McLean County Museum of History, Greg Koos. Koos will discuss his recent book, *Freedom, Land, and Community: A History of McLean County Illinois, 1730–1900.* In his book, Koos tells the story of the diverse peoples and events of this county. Using sources contemporary with the events described, it relates the struggle to shape the land, build community, and secure freedom as these communities knew and defined it. Native peoples, women and men, African Americans, Irish and German immigrants all sought and contested for their freedom. People whose voices have not been heard in previous works about Central Illinois are included here.

Greg Koos served and led the McLean County Museum of History in Bloomington, Illinois from 1977 to 2016. His work there was recognized with numerous state and national awards. His historical research has been published in the United States and Ireland. Koos lives with his wife, Carol, in his hometown of Bloomington.
