### **How time flies**

#### 150 years ago-1873

Richard Edwards went on the defensive for the University when advocating for financial appropriations for the institution's budget at the Illinois State Legislature. Several lawmakers accused the University of being "aristocratic in its character" and only open to "rich parents." As a counterpoint, Edwards recalled the story of a "most excellent and successful pupil" who disclosed that she was almost out of money and was considering leaving the school. Seeing her need, he asked her to stay and to come to him when she needed additional funds. Edwards reports: "When at the end of the term she left us, her record was complete and honorable, and she bore in her hand a certificate, most cheerfully and heartily given, expressing her worth as a woman and a teacher. So much for aristocracy!"

#### 100 years ago–January - March 1923

- Betsy Edwards, the wife of ISNUs second president, Richard Edwards, passed away on December 22 at the age of 97.
   Mrs. Edwards was one of the oldest residents of McLean County at that time. She was reportedly a descendant of Myles Standish, a military consultant who traveled on the Mayflower and helped administer the Plymouth Colony. The Vidette, January 3, 1923 (Vol. 35, No. 15, pg 1).
- "Vaudville, Side-Shows, and Dance" were the stars of the annual Women's Athletic Association carnival on the evening of February 3. The event was held at the gymnasium and featured fortune-telling, food stands, musicians, and traditional carnival acts. *The Vidette*, February 7, 1923 (Vol. 35, No. 20, pg 3).
- President Felmley's most recent commencement address made its way into a new publication called *The American Student. The Vidette* reported that the magazine "devoted to the interests of college students throughout the country" printed excerpts of President Felmley's speech. However, the exact excerpts were not mentioned. *The Vidette*, March 28, 1923 (Vol. 35, No. 26, pg 6).

#### 75 years ago-January - March 1948

- An oil shortage at Cardinal Court and the high cost of living are major concerns for residents of Cardinal Court. The mayor of the "village" consisting of military veterans and their families cites the lack of oil in the Midwest and the drastic increase in spaces utilized—"16 apartments and 12 dormitories, each requiring a central heating unit, as compared with 85 apartments and 30 dormitories this winter." *The Vidette*, January 14, 1948 (Vol. 60, No. 14, pg 1).
- The University reported 1,935 students enrolled in the second

- semester of the 1947-1948 academic year. Of that total, 978 men and 957 women. Veteran enrollment dropped between semesters from 614 to 577. Of that total, 549 were registered under the G.I. Bill, 28 under state military scholarships, and 13 were women military veterans. *The Vidette*, February 4, 1948 (Vol. 60, No. 16, pg 1).
- Ruth Yates's class, Introduction to Radio Broadcasting, addressed public health concerns like giving tips for appendicitis, explaining hypertension, and creating a radio demonstration of giving a baby a bath. The cross-disciplinary class taught radio students how to convey health concerns to the public. The cast of eight also created a show "on the dangers of self-medication without adequate medical knowledge."
   The Vidette, March 10, 1948 (Vol. 60, No. 21, pg 3).

#### 50 years ago-January - March 1973

- Eric H. Johnson, the University's vice president, announced his retirement. Though he planned to stay active in other professional roles, Johnson and his wife explored options outside of Illinois. First an ISU alum, Johnson began his professional career in secondary education in the towns of Tamms, Bonfield, and Flanagan. *The Vidette*, January 5, 1973 (Vol. 85, No. 47, pg 1).
- Phil Steffen, ISU student body president, was among the first
  of two students ever to be selected for an Illinois university
  governing board. Michael J. Bakalis, state superintendent of
  public instruction, named Steffen for the role on the University of Illinois Board of Trustees. In that role, Steffen served
  as Bakalis's stand-in for his absences and represented in a
  non-voting capacity. *The Vidette*, February 2, 1973 (Vol. 85,
  No. 56, pg 1).
- Dean of Undergraduate Instruction Stanley Rives announced the launch of undergraduate teaching assistants. The new program would select 60 qualified undergraduate students to assist with leading group discussions, lab work, and other classroom needs. The students would be paid \$450 for a semester or \$900 for the academic year and earn three-course credits toward graduation. *The Vidette*, March 2, 1970 (Vol. 85, No. 71, pg 6).

#### 25 years ago-January - March 1998

- Searches for the president and provost began in earnest.
   Chairperson Borg pointed senate members to the letter written by Board of Trustee Chairperson William Sulaski about the presidential search. Later in the meeting, President Strand updated the senate on the early stages of the provost search, including identifying search committee members. Illinois State University, Academic Senate Meeting Minutes, January 21, 1998, pg 3-4.
- President Strand announced a presentation by Dr. Tak Chung at the next Board of Trustees meeting. The presentation would center on the use of technology in the classroom and its value in various instructional processes. The 9 a.m. meeting would

- include a discussion hour before Dr. Tak Chung's presentation. Illinois State University, Academic Senate Meeting Minutes, February 4, 1998, pg 4.
- Vice President Boschini announced the next Minority Scholar in Residence, Dr. Gwendolyn Mikell, chair of African Studies in the School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University. Dr. Val Moghadam recommended Mikell for the role. Mikell planned to be on campus from April 5-8. Illinois State University, Academic Senate Meeting Minutes, March 18, 1998, pg 4.

# Endowments like yours encourage exploration and creativity

Professor Emerita Lois Jett began amassing a historic costume collection in 1962 for Illinois State University's then-Department of Home Economics. Today, students within the Department of Family and Consumer Sciences carry on Jett's vision for the teaching tool through regular exhibitions of historic clothing. An endowment Jett established in 1970 continues to fund updates to the collection, which now boasts more than 2,000 items, including clothing, textiles, and related artifacts.

Dr. Jennifer Banning, professor of fashion design and merchandising, and director of the Lois Jett Historic Costume Collection, said the collection's newest addition—a black dress form—was purchased with funds from the Lois Jett Historic Costume Collection Fund.

"The form is different from what we have currently because this one has arms and can be customized to add a head and/or thighs, meaning we'll more easily be able to display pants and headwear," Banning said. "We ordered one in black in an effort to provide more diversity in our exhibition practices."

Banning noted the purchase would not have been possible without support from Jett's endowment. Such additions enable students to interact more deeply with the collection and resulting exhibitions.

Recent graduate Ye Fatuki '22 worked on a Cruella De Vilthemed display for the latest exhibition, *Broadway, Baby: Fashion on Stage*.

"I love the fact that I got to have fun and got to play with my ideas and integrate different textures into the window display," said Fatuki, who is now working full-time to build his own fashion brand. Fatuki said the hands-on experience allowed him to explore his imagination and view the exhibit through a childlike lens.

# How to recognize and avoid phishing and phone scams

Phishing scams can represent a serious threat to you, your personal information, and your finances. Phishing attempts try to coerce you into giving away your most valuable information such as bank account numbers, credit card numbers, passwords, social security number, even your mother's maiden name. The people behind phishing scams want your personal info, and they are willing to go to great lengths to trick you into handing over your identity.


How can you tell the difference between a phishing scam and a legitimate call, email, or website? Unfortunately, phishing scams are becoming more and more sophisticated and increasingly difficult to identify. However, there are several strategies you can use to recognize phishing scams.

 Be skeptical! Since you know phishing scams are out there, be skeptical of emails you receive. Has your account really been violated? Do you really need to update your account information? Most companies don't wait until the last minute to spring emergencies like this on their customers. They send several notices, oftentimes through the regular mail, or they

- Verify the web address and email address. Checking the addresses is a good way of discovering a scam. If the first part of the web address consists of numbers, the site should probably not be trusted. For example, this is an untrustworthy address: https://172.168.15.100/ebay/account. Even though *ebay* is part of the address, the first part contains numbers (called an IP address). This is a sign that something may not be right.
- Look for signs of security. Real corporate websites use secure, encrypted web pages any time their customers are asked to send personal and financial information. Look for https:// in the web address. The s stands for secure. Also look for a locked padlock icon in the lower part of your browser window or to the left of the address bar. The locked padlock icon indicates the site is encrypted, which means your data is protected when you send it over the Internet. If you don't see these signs, then the site could be a fake.
- Look for fishy (phishy) details. Most legitimate corporate emails and websites look professional. Phishing scams try to fool you, but like a photocopied dollar bill, they just do not look right. Look for poor grammar, poor spelling, and poor design. If your instincts tell you something is fishy, it probably is. Phishing scams are becoming more sophisticated each day, so this is not a sure-fire way of sniffing out a fake, but it's still a good place to start.
- Make a few phone calls. Before you click any links or fill out any forms, call the company, and don't use the phone number in the email. Get a real person on the phone to help you verify the legitimacy of the email you received. If you can't reach a company representative by phone, call the Technology Support Center at (309) 438-4357.
- Illinois State University will never ask for your password. If
  you receive a call or email explicitly asking for your password,
  this is likely a phishing attempt. University tech teams do not
  need your password in order to assist you and will never ask
  for it.
- Do not grant remote access to an untrusted source. Phone phishing scammers will often try to get you to go to a website and remotely take over your PC. Any remote connection requests should come from a trusted source, and the University will only ever ask to screen connect (in circumstances to help diagnose a problem) by directing you to <a href="ScreenConnect.">ScreenConnect.</a>
  IllinoisState.edu.
- Contact the Technology Support Center at ISU! If you are still uncertain of the legitimacy of an email you have received, contact the Technology Support Center which can verify whether or not the email is legitimate or spam. You can also check Illinois State's alert page at <a href="Alerts.IllinoisState.edu">Alerts.IllinoisState.edu</a>, which is frequently updated with current spam messages being sent to university Outlook email recipients. To inquire about a questionable email you have received, give the TSC



a call at (309) 438-4357 or send us an email at <a href="ITHelp@IllinoisState.edu">ITHelp@IllinoisState.edu</a>. You can also submit a service request at <a href="Help">Help</a>. It is also recommended that you forward a copy of the suspicious email to the TSC so they can better determine the legitimacy of it.

Utilizing an insurance-based incentive program to pay for your membership at ARC is beneficial for both you and ARC! You receive the benefits of an ARC membership such as opportunities for socialization, access to a wide variety of exercise classes and services, and participation in ever-evolving educational programs, card and game groups, art and more, for free while ARC is reimbursed per visit or up to \$20/month by SilverSneakers as long as you scan your key fob at entry.

The money received by these partners that goes beyond what a standard membership can provide ultimately help the ARC team provide members with the program offerings you have come to love by improving the Normal Township budget for senior services.

Prospero seeks revenge but discovers forgiveness and generosity in this tale full of magical spirits.

Patrons can also anticipate other beloved staples of the Illinois Shakespeare Festival experience including a Theatre for Young Audiences (TYA) production, Summer Camps for Youth, the annual John Stevens Memorial Golf Outing on Monday, June 19, and the unforgettable end of season Bard Bash and Cabaret on Sunday, August 6.

Season tickets for the 2023 season will be available beginning Tuesday, February 14. Individual tickets will be available beginning Tuesday, March 21.
